Aughhh! Snow! Already! Maybe this is a brief, temporary interruption of cool, crisp, not frigid, autumn days. Days free of mosquitoes and deer flies, days of leaves that crackle underfoot, not sodden leaves compressed under snow.

Our October meeting was an interesting presentation by Kate Jeanson and Charles Fazer of the Saratoga County Clerk's Office. The program was "Treasures of the Past" and "Museums of Saratoga County".

The November 7 meeting will feature Paul Perreault speaking on "Elmer Ellsworth: The Most Talked About Man in the Country". Elmer Ellsworth, said to be the first Union officer killed in the Civil War, was born in Malta and grew up in Mechanicville. He went on to study law in Abraham Lincoln's office, and worked on Lincoln's 1860 presidential campaign.

It is with great sadness that we mourn the death of founding and long-time GPS member Mary Packer on October 19th at age 99. Mary served as Town of Providence Historian from 1957 to 2010 and was a member of many local organizations. She was an invaluable source of information on life in our community during the first half of the twentieth century and will be greatly missed.

Our new display in Galway Town Hall was set up on October 19th and is entitled "Brookside Museum: A Galway Retrospective". It contains artifacts, documents and photos that depict various aspects of Galway life through the years that were provided by the Brookside Museum in Ballston Spa. We are very grateful to Joy Houle –

Director, Kathleen Coleman – Curator and Samantha Strevy –Administrative Assistant of the Museum for all the time and effort they put forth in bringing this exhibit to fruition. Patty Kay of our Display Committee did an outstanding job of printing copies of the historical documents and photographs from scans provided by Brookside and arranging the items in the display cases. Members are encouraged to view this interesting and informative exhibit.

Dreaming in Barkersville

Snow to the top of the henhouse. Too late to check the pond.

The cutter waits at the end of my road. Bill holds the reins and waves to me. In back, Bob and Sophie, bundled in buffalo robes, lift one for me to climb under.

Six miles to Galway School. Down Parkis Mills and Mack Roads. The cutter sways, lurches over snow drifts. Cold bites everywhere it can reach. "I wonder if the pond is frozen," I whisper to Sophie.

I bury my head in the buffalo robe.

When I look out, I am in school, warmed by the stove. My friends all around me, heads bent over desks. I look outside, draw circles on the fogged-up windows. When I turn back again,

we're bundled in the backseat of the cutter. Lantern light sweeps over the snow. If the pond is frozen, I think, we'll have to shovel for It is almost dark when I jump from the cutter, wave good-

bye

and hurry down the road toward the farmhouse.

The house breathes warmth and baking bread. Mother's face is flushed from the heat of the stove. I'm glad you're home," she says, her voice soft with relief. Then she puts down the bread, picks up her usual briskness. "Now change your clothes and see if your father needs help."

Father, framed in a circle of lantern light, milks the last cow.

Later, I sneak out to the pond.

Cats mill around him, waiting for a squirt of steaming milk.

If it is frozen there will be bonfires, singing and hockey on Saturday night. I dig through the snow to the ice, turn back to the farmhouse, but awaken instead in another house, 80 years later and smile at the words I brought all the way back with me.
