A Time for Celebration! Mildred Hathaway Turns 100

Long-time GPS members and others will remember Mildred Hathaway. She is a charter member of GPS. Our organization has benefited greatly from her membership and leadership. A review of Mildred's participation in local history projects is a review of the founding history of the Galway Preservation Society.

If one could pick a starting point for GPS, it would probably be at a meeting of the Galway Bicentennial Committee in 1974. Mildred and Harry Hathaway were general chairmen of the committee's first event on November 2, 1974, celebrating the 200th birthday of Elizabeth Kelly, the first white child born in Galway. In 1975 Mildred prepared a bicentennial house tour map to go with the book, Galway Today with Glimpses of the Past, compiled by Harry. Their next bicentennial project was arranging for the reproduction of a piece of salt-glazed stoneware made in Galway by Hudson and French Pottery. Mildred took orders and distributed 127 pieces of the pottery. The profits from this project and funds received in memory of Harry, who died in 1978, were used for landscaping at the Joseph Henry Elementary School.

The bicentennial committee activities brought about a renewed interest in local history. By 1981 our Galway Preservation Society had been formed. Mildred was president for at least two terms. In 1982 she teamed up with Kenda Clifford to organize a Homecoming Day for anyone who had attended Galway School. More than 500 people attended, and a Galway Central School Directory was published. In 1983, the Society purchased a two-drawer file cabinet for the storage of historic records and photos. Members of the archives committee were Mildred Hathaway, June Michelfelder, Florence Reedy, Arlene Rhodes, and Pat Sanders. The file cabinet was placed in the high school library where community members could do research. Because of this cooperative effort with the school, GPS received one of the Heritage Awards presented by the Federation of Historical Services in 1984. Mildred also organized a welcome reception at the high school for new residents. She drove around

town gathering names of newcomers from mailboxes, and sent out invitations. At the reception she showed colored slides she had taken of Town landmarks. These were given to the Joseph Henry Elementary School for use in the 4th grade social studies curriculum. She also identified historic sites in the Town of Galway on school bus tours for the 4th grade students and teachers.

With a growing interest in local history and a penchant for detail and accuracy, Mildred devoted time to research and publication for GPS and other organizations. In 1980 and 1981 Mildred served on a committee that arranged for the reproduction of two sets of real-photo postcards of Galway in the early 1900s with historical captions. When Mildred's good friend Elsie Maddaus wrote Brief History of the Galway United Methodist Church to 1978, Mildred was the church historian. She helped Elsie with the research and handled the photos. In 1984 she prepared Index and Errata for Stories and Pictures of Galway by W. Bronson Taylor, a GPS publication. In 1986 she completed her Inventory of Jersey Hill Cemetery, including sketches of the stones. Mildred did research locally and at the library in Oakland, California for a GPS planned publication on Horace W. Carpentier. Her article, "Grass Roots," tracing the lineage and history of the Carpentier family, is in the GPS archives. In 1988 she wrote a booklet for elementary school students, Glass Factory Mountain, published by the National Bottle Museum.

As a member of the GPS committee in charge of the Village of Galway Sesquicentennial Celebration in 1988, Mildred arranged for a second set of reproduction Hudson and French salt-glazed stoneware in a different style from the 1976 set. "The cost has skyrocketed," she said, "so it remains to be seen how popular this set will be." A total of 550 stoneware crocks were sold. With \$4,000 in the treasury that year, GPS President Herb Kopper teased Mildred, who was treasurer, about taking a trip to Aruba. Weeks later, someone in our community asked Mildred how she enjoyed Aruba! The ending of the story is that Mildred did travel to Aruba in 1999, long after she was GPS treasurer.

Among the projects for the Sesquicentennial celebration was a publication, *Galway Yesterday and To-* *day.* It earned our Society its second Heritage Award from the Federation of Historical Services, for which Mildred had applied. She also submitted the application for an individual award given to Society member C. Donald Carpenter for his original Galway Village map of 1838.

One final credit for GPS success must be given to Mildred. In 1988, she did the research and compiled ten pages of supporting information detailing activities, publications, and awards for the application for our provisional charter, which Galway Preservation Society received from the NYS Education Department in 1989.

Mildred and her husband Harry moved to Galway in 1946. In 1948 they bought the Anderson farm on Consaul Road where they raised their five children, Charles, Carol, Bonnie, Bill and John. Mildred taught in Galway schools for a few years and went on to teach special education in Schenectady. She always found time for many other activities. She served as lay leader at her church and taught Sunday school, participated in the book group and genealogy group at Ballston Spa Public Library, taught chair caning to inmates at the County jail, and delivered Meals on Wheels. A member of the Galway Senior Citizens, she was on the staff of the Glowegee Scroll and served as program chair. She is a life member of the WCTU. At the National Bottle Museum, she lectured and served as a docent, librarian and member of the board of trustees. And when there was free time, Mildred reupholstered chairs and sofas, braided rugs, sewed and altered clothing, and played bridge.

In 1990 Mildred moved to Rochester, New York. She came back to celebrate the Town of Galway Bicentennial with us in 1992, and continues to be a GPS member. In "Reminiscences" which was published in the GPS Journal, May 2011, Mildred said, "…living in Galway meeting many friends was the best part of my life." Mildred will celebrate her 100th birthday on October 12th. This is a time for GPS members to celebrate her birthday and to celebrate her contributions to our Society.
